Creative energy of local artists keeps galleries humming

Despite the weak economy and decreasing financial support, local art venues are brimming with activity, from historical surveys and themed group exhibitions to solo shows by emerging artists. Here's a look at some of what's going on.

The Cleveland Artists Foundation has a tradition of presenting regional art from various angles. "Beyond Reality: Ohio Artists After Surrealism" is the institution's latest offering. Curated by local art historian Elizabeth McClelland, it features works by 18 Northeast Ohio art-

Based on the ideas of the Surrealists of the 1920s, the show tries to demonstrate the ongoing influence of that movement and expose related threads thought running through the decades to the work of contemporary artists.
